TAKE NOTICE that on the 10th Day of October, 2019, at the hour of 6:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard, the Fayette County Board and Councils of Vandalia, Ramsey, St Elmo and Brownstown will conduct a joint public hearing at the Banquet Hall at the Moose Lodge, 328 S 3rd St, Vandalia, IL 62471 Illinois, to receive public comment on the topic of allowing recreational sales of cannabis or cannabis infused products within the several incorporated areas and unincorporated areas of Fayette County, Illinois.

As of January 1, 2020, Illinois residents over age 21 will be allowed to possess up to 30 grams of raw cannabis, 5 grams of cannabis concentrate or infused products containing 500 mg of THC. While local governments are prevented from imposing regulations that conflict or are more stringent than state law; certain restrictions may be applied locally which may limit or prohibit recreational sales, defining zoning or permitting requirements and enacting local ordinances to assess penalties for violations.



### It's the Law

On May 31, 2019 Illinois legalized the sale, possession and use of marijuana for recreational purposes for adults 21 and over through the

# Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act

While the act does provide Counties and Cities with some authorities;

Local Government May Not Prohibit the possession or use of marijuana for recreational purposes



# The act does not change the law about medicinal marijuana

- dispensary. There are currently 55 Medical Cannabis Dispensaries in Illinois These sites have "early approval" for adding a recreational marijuana
- Fayette County does not have a Medical Cannabis Dispensary, therefore "early approval" expansion is not an issue
- Current law allows up to 200 dispensaries in 2020 and up to 500 by 2022. There are existing amendments to increase this number



## There are still some limitations on possession

### For Residents

- 30 grams of cannabis flower
- 5 grams of concentrate
- 500 milligrams of THC in infused products

### For Non-Residents

- 15 grams of cannabis flower
- 2.5 grams of concentrate
- 250 milligrams of THC in infused products.



# There are still some prohibited behaviors

- No consumption in a "public place"
- No consumption on school grounds
- No consumption in close proximity to persons under 21

# There are still some prohibited behaviors (continued)

- No smoking cannabis in any location where smoking is prohibited by the Smoke Free Illinois Act
- No sale to minors under age 21
- No home delivery to consumers by a dispensary
- No possession or use by a minor other than for medical cannabis
